Pursuant to Standing Order 107(3) the Committee has agreed to report the following:

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INTRODUCTION

One of the Liaison Committee's main responsibilities is to apportion the funds, allocated by the Board of Internal Economy (BOIE) for this purpose, which are required to conduct the activities of standing committees. These activities include the examination of selected matters in greater depth than is possible in the House of Commons and committees may report conclusions of those examinations, including recommendations, to the House. Committees undertake studies in four general areas: the Estimates, legislation, Order-in-Council appointments, and subject matter studies. In order to conduct these studies, committees may choose to hear from witnesses in Ottawa or may travel to other locations. It should also be noted that in addition to the regular expenses of standing committees, the BOIE decided that the budgets for the Special Committee on Violence Against Indigenous Women would be charged against the funds available for standing committees and standing joint committees.

In recent years, the Liaison Committee has initiated various updates to the administrative practices and funding policies that govern the activities of standing committees. In June 2013, the members of the Liaison Committee approved the implementation of management best practices to ensure available budgets and standing committee expenditures meet expectations regarding the value of goods and services received.

To that end, this document gives members of Parliament and the general public a clearer view of committee activities, and the related expenditures, approved by committee members. This information complements the up-to-date information provided to committee chairs on a monthly basis. In addition, the report also provides some general metrics regarding the number of: meetings, meeting hours, reports, and witnesses. The Liaison Committee's intention is to continue presenting such reports three times per fiscal year, for each of the following periods: April 1st to June 30th, July 1st to December 31st and January 1st to March 31st.

In certain instances there may be minor discrepancies between the expenditure amounts in this report and those of a previous report from the same fiscal year. These differences can be attributed to a number of things. In some instances, even though a trip has ended or a study has been concluded, invoices may have been received following the preparation of the report and would therefore only show in the following report. However, with the conclusion of the 2013-2014 fiscal year, the expenditures in this report are the final amounts for this year. In other cases and as permitted by the Liaison Committee, a committee may have used its basic operational budgets as interim funding for a study awaiting budgetary approval and once approval was received, the expenditures were then transferred from the basic operational budget to the study budget. In these latter instances, the expenditures remain the same but are allocated to a different budget.

The present report covers the complete 2013–2014 fiscal year. During this period, a total of 877 committee meetings were held, 2,656 witnesses were heard and 124 reports were presented to the House. In addition, as this report covers the entire fiscal year, some additional information has been included to facilitate comparisons between fiscal years. Similar information has been provided in the past through the *Annual Report on Committee Activities and Expenditures*, tabled in the House by the Speaker of the House of Commons on behalf of the BOIE, and recent copies of those reports are available on the Parliamentary website.

STANDING COMMITTEE ON ABORIGINAL AFFAIRS AND NORTHERN DEVELOPMENT (AANO)

From April 1 to June 30, 2013, the Committee studied Bill C-428, An Act to Amend the Indian Act (Publication of By-Laws) and to provide for its replacement; Bill S-8, An Act Respecting the Safety of Drinking Water on First Nation Lands; and Bill C-62, An Act to give effect to the Yale First Nation Final Agreement and to make consequential amendments to other Acts. All bills were reported back to the House of Commons.

In the period from July to December 2013, the Committee continued its study of *Land-Use and Sustainable Economic Development*. It also considered the Supplementary Estimates (B) 2013–14 under Indian Affairs and Northern Development and Bill C-9, An Act respecting the election and term of office of chiefs and councillors, which it reported to the House. The Committee also began consideration of Bill C-15, the Northwest Territories Devolution Act.

Between January and the end of March 2014, the Committee continued consideration of Bill C-15, the Northwest Territories Devolution Act, which included holding public meetings in Yellowknife, Northwest Territories, and reporting the bill with amendments, back to the House, in early February. After 28 meetings, spanning more than two years, the Committee also completed its study of Land-Use and Sustainable Economic Development and presented its Fourth Report to the House in March. The Committee also considered the Supplementary Estimates (C) 2013–14. Furthermore, in late March, the Committee commenced consideration of Bill C-25, An Act respecting the Qalipu Mi'kmaq First Nation Band Order.

STANDING COMMITTEE ON ACCESS TO INFORMATION, PRIVACY AND ETHICS (ETHI)

The Standing Committee on Access to Information, Privacy and Ethics undertook and completed the statutory review of the Conflict of Interest Act. In addition, the Committee was able to study and report on the sections of the Main Estimates 2013–14 under Justice, Parliament and Treasury Board referred to it. Another piece of the Committee's work during this period was the study of its first piece of legislation in this Parliament. The Committee studied Bill C-461, An Act to amend the Access to Information Act and the Privacy Act (disclosure of information), and reported the bill back to the House with amendments.

In the period from July to December 2013, a new Chair, Mr. Pat Martin, was elected. The Committee completed its report on the statutory review of the *Conflict of Interest Act*.

Between January and the end of March 2014, the Committee presented its First Report to the House in relation to the statutory review of the *Conflict of Interest Act* and commenced consideration of Bill C-520, An Act supporting non-partisan agents of Parliament. The Committee also established a work plan for its study of the *Growing Problem of Identity Theft and its Economic Impact*.

STANDING COMMITTEE ON AGRICULTURE AND AGRI-FOOD (AGRI)

The Standing Committee on Agriculture and Agri-Food continued its large scale study of the *Agriculture and Agri-food Products Supply Chain*, hearing witnesses in relation to grains and oilseeds, the beverage sector and animal welfare. In anticipation of the House adjourning for the summer, the Committee tabled part 1 of its report on that study entitled "Toward a Common Goal: Canada's Food Supply Chain — Part 1". This report included all of the sections completed to date with the exception of the animal welfare component. The Committee also held meetings as a follow-up to the study of the Losses in Honey Bee Colonies which began last summer. The purpose of these meetings was to speak with stakeholders and learn what has happened in the last year on this file.

In the period from July to December 2013, the Committee elected a new chair, Mr. Bev Shipley. On November 5, the Committee began a study of the *Canada-European Union Comprehensive Economic and Trade Agreement (CETA) and the Effects of it on the Canadian Agriculture Sector.* The Committee met eight times to hear from witnesses for this study. On December 2 and 3, Committee members visited Washington, DC, to discuss the changes made to the American Country of Origin Labelling (COOL) rules with members of Congress and representatives of agricultural organizations.

Between January and the end of March 2014, the Committee began reviewing a draft report related to its consideration of the Canada-European Union Comprehensive Economic and Trade Agreement (CETA) and the Effects of it on the Canadian Agriculture Sector. The report was tabled in the House on March 27. The Committee also held two meetings on a study of the Grain Logistics System in Canada. Lastly, on March 31 the Committee commenced consideration of Bill C-30, An Act to amend the Canada Grain Act and the Canada Transportation Act and to provide for other measures.

STANDING COMMITTEE ON CANADIAN HERITAGE (CHPC)

During the period from April 1 to June 30, 2013, the Standing Committee on Canadian Heritage concluded its study of the Canadian Entertainment Software Industry, which it began in October 2012, and initiated a study of Significant Aspects of Canadian History. On the legislative front, the Committee examined Bill C-266, An Act to establish Pope John Paul II Day as well as Bill C-49, An Act to amend the Museum Act in order to establish the Canadian Museum of History and to make consequential amendments to others Acts.

In the period from July to December 2013, the Committee elected a new Chair, Mr. Gordon Brown. The Committee concluded its study of *Canada's Preparations for the 2014 Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games in Sochi*, which began in November 2013, and initiated a study of the *Canadian Music Industry*. It also considered the Supplementary Estimates (B) 2013–14 under Canadian Heritage.

Between January and the end of March 2014, the Committee studied Bill C-501, An Act respecting a National Hunting, Trapping and Fishing Heritage Day, and started to hear witnesses in relation to its *Review of the Canadian Music Industry*.

STANDING COMMITTEE ON CITIZENSHIP AND IMMIGRATION (CIMM)

During the period from April 1 to June 30, 2013, the Standing Committee on Citizenship and Immigration examined various issues. On the legislative front, the Committee considered Bill C-425, An Act to amend the Citizenship Act (honouring the Canadian Armed Forces), and heard from witnesses on the matter. The Committee also studied the subject matter of clauses 167 to 168 and 170 to 172 of Bill C-60, An Act to implement certain provisions of the budget tabled in Parliament on March 21, 2013 and other measures. In addition to its legislative agenda, the Committee also began a study of *Temporary Resident Visas for Visitors*. On the budgetary side, the Committee studied the Main Estimates 2013–14 under Citizenship and Immigration as well as Expenditure Plans for Citizenship and Immigration 2012–13.

In the period from July to December 2013, the Committee studied the subject matter of clauses 174 (*Criminal Code*) and 175 (*Department of Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development Act*) and 290 to 293 (*Immigration and Refugee Protection Act*) of Bill C-4, A second act to implement certain provisions of the budget tabled in Parliament on March 21, 2013 and other measures. The Committee also resumed its study of *Temporary Resident Visas for Visitors*. Finally, the Committee studied the Supplementary Estimates (B) 2013–14 under Citizenship and Immigration.

Between January and the end of March 2014, the Committee completed its study of *Temporary Resident Visas for Visitors* and presented its report in the House in March. The Committee also commenced a new study entitled *Strengthening the Protection of Women in our Immigration System*. Lastly, the Committee studied the Supplementary Estimates (C) 2013–14.

As well, the Committee studied the *Fall 2013 Report of the Commissioner of the Environment and Sustainable Development* and the Supplementary Estimates (B) 2013–14 under Environment.

During the period from April 1 to June 30, 2013, the Finance Committee heard from many witnesses, including the Minister of Finance, the Hon. Jim Flaherty, the former Governor of the Bank of Canada, Mark Carney, and his successor, Stephen S. Poloz. The Committee focused primarily on two studies: Bill C-60, An Act to implement certain provisions of the budget tabled in Parliament on March 21, 2013 and other measures, and its study of *Income Inequality in Canada*. On the legislative front, the Committee presented a report in the House on Bill S-17, An Act to implement conventions, protocols, agreements and a supplementary convention, concluded between Canada and Namibia, Serbia, Poland, Hong Kong, Luxembourg and Switzerland, for the avoidance of double taxation and the prevention of fiscal evasion with respect to taxes, and another report on Bill C-462, An Act restricting the fees charged by promoters of the disability tax credit and making consequential amendments to the Tax Court of Canada Act. Furthermore, the Committee reported back to the House on its study of *Tax Evasion and the Use of Tax Havens*. Finally, it began pre-budget consultations by inviting Canadians to submit their ideas online regarding their recommendations for the 2014 federal budget.

In the period from July to December 2013, the Committee heard from over 100 witnesses and presented three reports to the House of Commons. For its pre-budget consultations, the Committee received 336 online submissions containing recommendations for Budget 2014, which were posted on the Committee's website. In addition, it held six meetings on the economy, tourism, assistance for vulnerable Canadians, rural and urban development, and research and innovation. It then presented a report containing 42 recommendations. The Committee also studied and reported to the House on Bill C-4, A second act to implement certain provisions of the budget tabled in Parliament on March 21, 2013 and other measures. It heard from over 50 witnesses for this study. Finally, the Committee completed its study of *Income Inequality in Canada* and presented a report on the subject containing 24 recommendations.

Between January and the end of March 2014, the Committee completed two studies. It held four meetings on *Emerging Digital Payments Systems*, during which it heard from 20 witnesses. The Committee invited the businesses that appeared to present their technology to the Committee members during informal meetings. These information sessions gave the Committee a better appreciation of the potential of these new technologies and the legislative and regulatory changes that will be required. The Committee then held three meetings on *Youth Employment in Canada*, during which it heard from 19 witnesses.

STANDING COMMITTEE ON FISHERIES AND OCEANS (FOPO)

The period from April to June 2013 was marked by the beginning of the Committee's study of *Invasive Species that Pose a Threat to the Great Lakes System*, and its report on the matter was tabled in the House on April 25, 2013. The Committee then began a study of *Northern and Arctic Fisheries* on the heels of a Senate study of the same subject in 2009, but while also taking into account climate change and its impact on fish stocks. One meeting was dedicated to examining the Department of Fisheries and Oceans' *Report on Plans and Priorities 2013–14*. Current economic conditions also prompted the Committee to have a closer look at the situation facing the lobster fishery in Atlantic Canada.

In the period from July to December 2013, the Committee considered the Supplementary Estimates (B) 2013–14 under Fisheries and Oceans and then reviewed the programs and activities of Fisheries and Oceans Canada. The Committee also studied the Fish Component of the Canada-European Union Comprehensive Economic and Trade Agreement (CETA).

Between January and the end of March 2014, the Committee commenced a study of the *Potential Benefits and Challenges* of the Canada-European Union Comprehensive Economic and Trade Agreement (CETA) for Canadian Fisheries. The Committee also considered the Main Estimates 2014–15 under Fisheries and Oceans, hearing from the Minister and departmental officials.

STANDING COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN AFFAIRS AND INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT (FAAE)

From April to June 2013, the Standing Committee on Foreign Affairs and International Development carried out three studies related to its mandate. The Committee completed its study of *Canada's Arctic Foreign Policy* and presented its findings to the House of Commons on May 10, 2013. The Committee also completed a study of the *Situation of Jewish Refugees from Middle Eastern Nations* and, following travel to Washington, the Committee considered a draft report on the *Organization of American States (OAS) and Canada's Engagement in the Americas*. In addition, the Committee considered Bill S-14, An Act to amend the Corruption of Foreign Public Officials Act and reported it to the House on June 14, 2013, as well as the subject matter of clauses 174 to 199 (*Department of Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development Act*) of Bill C-60, An Act to implement certain provisions of the budget tabled in Parliament on March 21, 2013 and other measures.

The Committee also considered and reported the Main Estimates 2013–14 under Foreign Affairs and International Trade back to the House. Several briefings were organized on topics such as the *Corporate Practices by Companies Supplying and Manufacturing Products in Developing Countries for Canadian Consumers, Canada's Foreign Policy as it Relates to North Korea* and an update on the activities of the *Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria*. The Committee also examined reports from the Subcommittee on International Human Rights (SDIR) concerning, among others, the *Human Rights Situation in Burma* and the *Persecution of the Copt Community in Egypt*.

In the period from July to December 2013, the Committee studied Bill C-6, An Act to implement the Convention on Cluster Munitions. In addition, the Committee considered the Supplementary Estimates (B) 2013–14 under Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development. In addition, a briefing session was held with officials from the Department of Foreign Affairs on the situation in Syria. Finally, in December 2013, it presented reports on its studies regarding the Situation of Jewish Refugees from Middle Eastern Nations and on the Organization of American States (OAS) and Canada's Engagement in the Americas. The Subcommittee on International Human Rights also undertook an in-depth study of the Human Rights Situation in Sri Lanka.

Between January and the end of March 2014, the Committee undertook a study of the *Situation in Ukraine* and continued its study of the *Situation in Syria*. In addition, the Committee held a briefing session on the Office of Religious Freedom within the Department of Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development, as well as a briefing session on World Tuberculosis Day.

The Subcommittee on International Human Rights continued its study of the *Human Rights Situation in Sri Lanka* and, on February 27, agreed to a resolution on the situation there. It also held numerous briefing sessions on various human rights situations around the world including an update on the *Situation in Camp Ashraf* and a briefing session on the persecution of the Christian minority in Pakistan. The Subcommittee continued its study of *Forced Harvesting and Trafficking of Human Organs*, as well as its study of *Sexual Violence Against Women in the Democratic Republic of Congo* and agreed to report its findings on the latter to the main committee for its consideration. Finally, the Subcommittee began examining the *Situation Concerning Sexual Violence and Persecution of Religious Minorities in the Syrian Conflict*.

STANDING COMMITTEE ON GOVERNMENT OPERATIONS AND ESTIMATES (OGGO)

During the period from April to June 2013, the Government Operations and Estimates Committee focused primarily on its study of *Energy Efficiency in Government Buildings, Structures and Public Works* followed by the presentation of a report to the House in June. The Committee also considered the Main Estimates 2013–14 under Privy Council, Governor General, Parliament, Public Works and Government Services and Canadian Heritage, as well as some other matters, including: the *Integrated Relocation Program*; the *Public Service Pension Plan*; the *Integrity Provisions for Procurement and Real Property Transactions*; and the government response to the Committee's Seventh Report, entitled *Strengthening Parliamentary Scrutiny of Estimates and Supply*.

In the period from July to December 2013, the Committee elected a new chair, Mr. Pierre-Luc Dusseault. The Committee provided updates on several matters it has monitored for several years: the government's follow-up on the June 2012 report entitled Strengthening Parliamentary Scrutiny of Estimates and Supply, the *Renovations and Associated Costs for the Parliamentary Precinct Renovation Project* (including a site visit), and the *Mandate and Activities of the Build in Canada Innovation Program*. It also devoted several meetings to studying the Supplementary Estimates (B) 2013–14 under Treasury Board, Privy Council, Canadian Heritage, Public Works and Government Services. The Committee also studied the Public Service Commission's latest annual report.

Between January and the end of March 2014, the Committee considered two budget documents: the Supplementary Estimates (C) 2013–14 and the Main Estimates 2014–15. Regarding the Supplementary Estimates, the Committee heard from Treasury Board Secretariat officials. Regarding the Main Estimates, the Committee studied the appropriations for Public Works and Government Services Canada, Shared Services Canada and the Privy Council Office. The Committee also heard from the Treasury Board Secretariat, once again on its own appropriations, as well as an overview of planned government spending for 2014–2015. Lastly, the Committee commenced its *Study on the Government's Open Data Practices*. It began with an information session with Treasury Board Secretariat officials on the subject.

Between January and the end of March 2014, the Committee continued its study of *Employment Opportunities for Aboriginal Peoples*. In the period from July to December 2013, the Committee considered and reported on Bill C-489, An Act to amend the Criminal Code and the Corrections and Conditional Release Act (restrictions on offenders) and began its study of Bill C-10, An Act to amend the Criminal Code (trafficking in contraband tobacco). The Committee also studied the subject matter of clauses 471 and 472 of Bill C-4, A second act to implement certain provisions of the budget tabled in Parliament on March 21, 2013 and other measures. In addition, it considered the Supplementary Estimates (B) 2013–14 under Justice.

Between January and the end of March 2014, the Committee studied the Supplementary Estimates (C) 2013–14 under Justice. The Committee also continued its consideration of Bill C-10, An Act to amend the Criminal Code (trafficking in contraband tobacco). STANDING COMMITTEE ON NATURAL RESOURCES (RNNR)

Finally, the Committee finished hearing from witnesses for its study of Bill C-5, An Act to amend the Canada-Newfoundland Atlantic Accord Implementation Act, the Canada-Nova Scotia Offshore Petroleum Resources Accord Implementation Act and other Acts and to provide for certain other measures.

Between January and the end of March 2014, the Committee commenced its clause-by-clause consideration of Bill C-5 and reported it back to the House in February, with amendments. The Committee also finished hearing witnesses on its study of the Rare Earths Industry in Canada, and it commenced a study of the Cross-Canada Benefits of Developing the Oil and Gas Industry of the Energy Sector.

STANDING COMMITTEE ON PROCEDURE AND HOUSE AFFAIRS (PROC)

During the period from April to June 2013, the Committee completed its examination of objections filed by Members of the House of Commons regarding the reports of electoral boundaries commissions in Saskatchewan, British Columbia, Quebec and Ontario. The Committee also examined the Main Estimates for the House of Commons and the Chief Electoral Officer for the 2013–14 fiscal year. Furthermore, the Chief Electoral Officer appeared before the Committee regarding two reports prepared by Elections Canada. The Committee also examined the Order-in-Council appointment of Richard Fujarczuk to the position of Law Clerk and Parliamentary Counsel of the House of Commons.

In the period from July to December 2013, the Committee struck the membership of standing committees of the House of Commons and established the representation of the House of Commons on standing joint committees. The Committee undertook and completed a *Review of the Board of Internal Economy* pursuant to an Order of Reference from the House. The Committee was also referred the matter of a question of privilege respecting the right of a Member to sit and vote when he or she has failed to correct an electoral return as requested by Elections Canada. The Committee began its study with the appearance of the Chief Electoral Officer. The Subcommittee on Private Members' Business examined Private Members' bills and motions recently added to the Order of Precedence. Finally, the Committee recommended amendments to the Standing Orders, reducing from 12 to 10 the membership of standing committees. The Report was presented to, and adopted by, the House on December 3, 2013.

On January 30th, 2014, the Committee presented, and the House approved, a report on the membership of all standing committees of the House of Commons, pursuant to the Order that had been adopted in December 2013. The Committee then briefly continued its study of the question of privilege respecting the right of a Member to sit and vote when he or she has failed to correct an electoral return as requested by Elections Canada. In February, the Committee undertook its study of Bill C-23, An Act to amend the Canada Elections Act and other Acts and to make consequential amendments to certain Acts. Up and until March 31, the Committee held nine meetings in which the study was planned or testimony was gathered. This study occupied almost the entirety of the Committee's time in February and March; the Committee also agreed to hold additional meetings in the evening in order to accommodate a greater number of witnesses. In addition, the Subcommittee on Private Members' Business examined Private Members' bills and motions recently added to the Order of Precedence.

STANDING COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC ACCOUNTS (PACP)

From April to June 2013, the Standing Committee on Public Accounts held public hearings as well as report-writing meetings, covering eight studies in fulfilment of its mandate. Among others, the Committee examined audits dealing with the government's long-term fiscal analysis, and grant and contribution program reforms. In addition, the Committee met with a parliamentary delegation from Guyana. The Committee presented four reports to the House during this period, which included 10 recommendations to rectify deficiencies in government administration identified by the Auditor General, and to enhance parliamentary control of public spending. Reports included the Public Accounts of Canada 2012, the spending estimates of the Office of the Auditor General, and reports on the Auditor General's work on transfer payments to the aerospace sector and special examinations of Crown corporations.

In the period from July to December 2013, the Committee arranged briefings with the Office of the Auditor General of Canada and the Treasury Board of Canada Secretariat and initiated a study of the Public Accounts of Canada 2013. The Fall 2013 Report of the Auditor General of Canada was tabled in the House of Commons and referred to the Committee. The Auditor General appeared before the Committee on the subject of the nine audit chapters in this report, after which the Committee held a public hearing on one of the chapters it had decided to study individually: "Chapter 5, Preventing Illegal Entry Into Canada".

Between January and the end of March 2014, the Committee held meetings on two additional chapters of the Fall 2013 Report of the Auditor General: "Chapter 2, Access to Online Services"; and "Chapter 9, Offshore Banking—Canada Revenue Agency". The Committee also held a meeting to examine the Main Estimates 2014–15 for the Office of the Auditor General of Canada. During this period, the Committee considered and adopted reports on the Public Accounts of Canada 2013, and on two chapters of the Fall 2013 Report of the Auditor General: "Chapter 5, Preventing Illegal Entry Into Canada"; and "Chapter 2, Access to Online Services".

STANDING COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC SAFETY AND NATIONAL SECURITY (SECU)

During the period from April to June 2013, the Standing Committee on Public Safety and National Security continued its inquiry into the *Economics of Policing*. In addition to a fact-finding visit to Western Canada, the Committee travelled to California and England because of a need to gather evidence from foreign jurisdictions. Before the House adjourned for the summer, the Committee instructed its analysts to prepare an outline of a report related to this study.

In the period from July to December 2013, the Committee elected a new Chair, Mr. Daryl Kramp. The Committee continued its inquiry into the *Economics of Policing*. It also considered the Supplementary Estimates (B) 2013–14 under Public Safety and Emergency Preparedness.

Between January and the end of March 2014, the Committee considered C-479, An Act to amend the Corrections and Conditional Release Act (fairness for victims), and reported the bill back to the House, with amendments, in early March. The Committee commenced consideration of Bill C-483, An Act to amend the Corrections and Conditional Release Act (escorted temporary absence) and also continued consideration of its study of the *Economics of Policing*.

STANDING COMMITTEE ON THE STATUS OF WOMEN (FEWO)

Between January and the end of March 2014, the Committee considered Bill C-3, An Act to enact the Aviation Industry Indemnity Act, to amend the Aeronautics Act, the Canada Marine Act, the Marine Liability Act and the Canada Shipping Act, 2001, and to make consequential amendments to other Acts, and reported it to the House without amendment. The Committee also began consideration of the Main Estimates 2014–15, and resumed its study entitled *Review of the Canadian Transportation Safety Regime: Transportation of Dangerous Goods and Safety Management Systems*.

LIAISON COMMITTEE (LIAI)

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON VIOLENCE AGAINST INDIGENOUS WOMEN (IWFA)

The Special Committee on Violence Against Indigenous Women was created by motion of the House on February 26, 2013. It met for the first time on March 26 for the purpose of electing a chair and two vice-chairs. The Committee held another seven meetings from April until the end of June during which it heard from 28 witnesses.

The Special Committee was restored by motion of the House at the beginning of the Second Session of the 41st Parliament, and continued its study of violence against indigenous women. During that time, it held four meetings in which it heard from 26 witnesses.

Between January and the end of March 2014, the Committee continued hearing from witnesses before adopting its First Report entitled *Invisible Women: A Call to Action, A Report on Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women in Canada*. With the presentation of the Report to the House of Commons on March 7, the work of the Special Committee was completed.




FIGURE 1 – COMPARISON OF THE NUMBER OF COMMITTEE MEETINGS OVER THE LAST FIVE FISCAL YEARS (ALL COMMITTEES)

FIGURE 2 – COMPARISON OF THE GLOBAL ENVELOPE FOR THE LAST FIVE FISCAL YEARS






